## Trillium Gift of Life Network 2020/21 Highlights



The COVID-19 pandemic had a profound impact on our lives throughout 2020/21. Within the health care system, organ and tissue donation and transplantation were recognized as essential and life-saving and thus continued throughout the year, albeit at a reduced level. Trillium Gift of Life Network (TGLN) worked collaboratively with its hospital and healthcare partners to navigate the constantly shifting clinical landscape caused by COVID-19 so that **1,118** lives could be saved through organ transplantation and many more lives enhanced via **1,736** tissue donors.

I was on oxygen assistance for over a year and the last two months were spent in hospital while my family watched from a distance due to COVID-19. My miracle happened and I thank my donor every day for my gift. I can now walk, hold my husband's hand, see my family and once COVID-19 is gone – embrace them!"

Trillium Gift of Life Network's leadership facilitated the safe and effective continuation of organ and tissue donation and transplantation throughout the year, despite the pandemic. Specifically, TGLN:

- Developed and implemented a plan to reduce loss of organs, provide a safe path for organ and tissue recovery and transplant and provide a coordinated framework to gradually increase donation and transplant activity as a unified provincial system
- Developed a process to facilitate transportation of living donor kidneys from the donor's local hospital to the transplant hospital, to minimize donor's exposure to COVID-19
- Worked with Ministry of Health so that transplant patients and other high-risk patients received timely access to the COVID-19 vaccine

**1,118 ORGAN TRANSPLANTS** 

Improving access to transplantation and supporting optimal patient outcomes continue to be at the heart of Trillium Gift of Life Network's leadership role in transplantation. To accomplish this, TGLN:

- Developed Ontario's Referral and Listing Criteria for Multi-Organ Kidney Transplantation and Ontario's Referral and Listing Criteria for Paediatric Lung Transplantation, which are intended to improve and standardize access to transplantation
- Developed a patient infographic on the organ matching process for patients and their families in order to increase understanding of how donor organs are matched to recipients and how patients are prioritized on the wait list
- Completed a review of the Program for Reimbursing Expenses of Living Organ Donors (PRELOD), resulting in recommendations to broaden eligibility criteria, increase reimbursement rates and simplify the application process. Implementation began April 1, 2021
- Adopted listing criteria for liver transplantation to include the Alcoholic Liver Disease (ALD) protocol as an alternative pathway for ALD patients

Trillium Gift of Life Network consistently seeks new opportunities to improve donation performance, ensuring that all opportunities for donation are optimized. The success of organ and tissue donation in Ontario relies on our hospital partners' commitment to implement leading donation practices and integrate donation as part of quality end-of-life care. This past year, despite facing extraordinary challenges, our hospital partners maintained their strong commitment to donation. In 2020/21, TGLN:

- Improved donor care management through development of a new Donor
   Management Order Set to improve the consistency in testing requested and assessment of potential donors
- Furthered education in donation practices through developing and hosting an
  education session for critical care fellows and contributing to the development of
  the donation stream at the annual Critical Care Canada Forum in Fall 2020. Developed
  primary education for healthcare professionals to enable the rapid recovery of the
  standardized Non-Perfused Organ Donation (NPOD) program, as well as expansion
  of NPOD after Donation After Cardiac Death (DCD) Attempt and NPOD Following
  Medical Assistance in Dying (MAID) At-Home
- Partnered with additional paramedic services across Ontario to increase tissue referral volumes
- Assumed the role of screening for tissue suitability for two additional Ontario tissue banks: Mount Sinai Allograft Technologies and The Hospital for Sick Children

Trillium Gift of Life Network's marketing and outreach programs resulted in **71,833 Ontarians** registering to be a donor in 2020/21. Registrations play a critical role in obtaining consent for donation from families and reflect Ontario's progress in developing a culture where donation is an expected part of end-of-life-care.

- Marketing campaigns, which ran September to October and February to March, raised awareness and increased registration for donation
- Social media initiatives drove traffic to BeADonor.ca resulting in a total of 129,124 unique visitors (an 18% increase versus last fiscal)
- TGLN, in partnership with ServiceOntario, developed integrated organ and tissue donation messaging for email reminders for driver's license, vehicle license plate and health card renewals, as well as for online appointment booking confirmations
- TGLN fully supported hospital, government and community stakeholders and partners, as well as its advocate network, to extend the breadth and depth of outreach
